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## 10TH ANNUAL ROLL CALL - How Our MPs Performed In 2014

Following an election which delivered a massive win for John Key's National and a drubbing for Labour, in this, the 10th annual Roll Call, Trans Tasman's Editors have ranked the MPs who have left Parliament post-election, as well as the newbies and the old hands who were in the House this year. Roll Call looks at how MPs performed in Caucus, Cabinet, Committee, the House, their electorate and the influence they bring, or are likely, to bring to bear in their various forums. The MPs are ranked by Trans Tasman's highly respected team of Capital insiders.

## 2014 Politician Of The Year - John Key

Head and shoulders above the competition, NZ's most popular PM, winner of three elections increasing the number of National seats each time, and now looking towards a fourth term. Key has not only performed strongly at home, he has become an international figure as well, cementing his and NZ's reputation abroad with his election as chairman of the International Democratic Union.

However there are clouds. The fallout from the "Dirty Politics" saga continues. It should have been firmly put to bed in the campaign. And Key's tendency to "forget," or "mishear" the question is becoming a worrying feature of the way he involves himself in the Parliamentary and media discourse.

He has the respect - almost the love - of the voters, he needs to be careful he does not treat them with contempt. A fourth term does beckon, but the PM's tendency to be just a bit smug, a bit arrogant, and at times a bit childish could derail it.

For now he is a titan, but Labour has a new leader and a new sense of purpose, and the next election is a long way away.

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
